


CMB Students Present Research and Receive Awards





The title of his talk was "Influence of vasoactive intestinal polypeptide on growth performance and health in sheep". Kafi also gave an oral presentation at the ASAS-Midwest annual meeting in Madison, WI. The title of his talk was "The effects of feeding hempseed cake on pancreatic and jejunal digestive enzymatic activity in finishing heifers".

CMB Faculty Receive Awards



Dr. Chris Colbert (Chemistry and Biochemistry) received a competitive NIH supplement for the purchase of a NanoTemper Monolith Pico Red/Blue microscale thermophoresis instrument. This instrument is capable of measuring binding interaction between molecules with affinities between micromolar to picomolar. He also was awarded an ND EPSCoR equipment grant to purchase a Sorvall Lynx 600 high-speed centrifuge. These awards have brought cutting-edge structural biology and biochemistry infrastructure to NDSU. Congratulations, Dr. Colbert!



Dr. Yagna Jarajapu (Pharmaceutical Sciences) received a three-year Translational Grant Award from the American Heart Association. The title of the research project is "Targeting the ß-Splice Variant of TERT in CD34+ Cells for Diabetic Vascular Disease". Dr. Jarajapu also received a U24 Type B pilot award from The National Institutes of Health NIDDK Cooperative Center of Excellence in Hematology to study the TERT splice variants and myelopoiesis in diabetic CD34+ cells. Dr. Sheela Ramamoorthy (Microbiological Sciences) was awarded a USDA-NIFA small business innovation (SBIR) grant along with co-investigators, Dr. Gregory Tobin (Biological Mimetics Inc.) and Dr. Viju Pillai (South Dakota State University). The grant entitled "An improved PCV2 vaccine" will explore the application of artificial intelligence-(AI) based algorithms for vaccine antigen and epitope discovery. Dr. Sangita Sinha (Chemistry and Biochemistry) was awarded an NIH R15 grant "Molecular mechanism by which Epstein-Barr Virus-encoded BCL2 down-regulates BECN1mediated autophagy". She also received an EPSCoR equipment grant to obtain two Eppendorf I-26 Stacking Incubating Shakers for large scale bacterial cell culture, which will expand biochemistry research capabilities at NDSU.
