ND State Soil Conservation Committee

Committee Background Information —The State Soil Conservation Committee was a stand-alone state agency overseeing the 54 State Soil Conservation Districts. The Committee had its own staff, which consists of a director, a business manager, a program coordinator, support staff members and its own budget until 1997. Following the 1997 Legislative session, the Committee's budget was moved to be under the NDSU Extension budget. Significant budget efficiencies were achieved when this transition occurred and the agency was downsized to a program coordinator and support staff member. The duties of the Committee are described in North Dakota Century Code (N.D.C.C.) 4.1-20-05.

SCDAP and District Activity Reporting Tool—The Soil Conservation District Assistance Program (SCDAP) is being used to provide all 54 of the Soil Conservation Districts a source of state funds to be devoted to the acquisition of technical services, specifically conservation administrative assistance, planning and design, installation and checkout of conservation practices. The SCDAP allows the local Soil Conservation District to determine how it will use local District Staff to address their conservation workload needs.

On July 1, 2019, the District Activity Reporting Tool (DART software) was launched to provide the Districts and Committee an updated on-line Activity Report. The Districts use the DART to record District activities for accountability to receiving SCDAP funding. The DART program has recently been updated so District activities and the top Conservation District Priority areas are identified and how progress is being made in these areas.

SCD Supervisor Training - Mandatory Annual Supervisor Training Bill was passed during the Legislative Assembly. The following options to meet the new Legislation are:

<u>Newly Elected or Newly Appointed SCD Supervisors</u> need to attend a Leadership Academy Level One training during the 1st year in office.

All Other SCD Supervisors (completing one of the three options)

- >> View on-line training modules and attend area approved meeting
- >> Attend the North Dakota Association of Soil Conservation Annual Convention
- >> Attend Leadership Academy Level One or Two Training

Leadership Academy Training - The Soil and Water Conservation Leadership Academy was first offered to SCD staff, Supervisors, and NRCS staff in January 2018. The Leadership Academy was developed by NDSU Extension and the Dept. of Health under an EPA 319 grant. The locally delivered educational program builds the participant's skills and enhances their ability to lead conservation projects now and for future generations. The Leadership Academy Level One has been attended by 184 participants and 44 of the 54 Districts have been represented. A Level Two Leadership Academy has been developed and will be offered in 2020 funded by a NRCS Grant.

Committee Request

The State Soil Conservation Committee would like to thank the SBARE Committee for its support for Soil Conservation District work and the soil and water conservation practices in the State of North Dakota.

least restored to the 2015—
2017 Biennium level of \$1.21
million.

The State Soil Conservation Committee is thankful for the current Biennium level of \$1.09 million. However, that level of funding is not keeping pace with the needs of the SCD.

A recent North Dakota Conservation District Employees Association wages and benefits survey verifies the salary and wages are lagging behind other job sectors.

As a result, Districts staff turnover continues to be a area of concern for all of the Districts.
