
Spirit of the Coteau: Student Ideas to Catalyze Rural Economic Development



Teepee ring lighting at night- Section S. Foss





Agri-ecotourism programs alow guests to earn their keep by helping replant native prairie plants and hearding cattle.



In fall of 2007, North Dakota State University Landscape Architecture students spent 7 weeks studying ways to expand the mission of the Central Grasslands Research Extension Center, looking for ideas for how the Center can host complimentary educational initiatives and display passive recreational uses for ranching lands to increase their economic viability. The proposals acknowledge that North Dakota ranchlands have long been used for hunting in addition to cattle raising. Yet recent research shows a compelling reason to expand beyond these traditional landuses. According to travel expert Marybeth Bond, 75% of those who currently take nature, adventure or cultural trips are women. A recent article in Road and Travel Magazine reported that women influence 85% of all vacation and travel decisions Worldwide, which suggests an opportunity for expansion of the rural tourism market in North Dakota. Charged with this insight and the challenge to create programmatic and design proposals for education and recreation based economic development, the student's ideas capitalize on the work, natural resources and spirit of the Coteau landscape at the Extension in Streeter, North Dakota.
